I, Detective Tailor Goods #336, a duly sworn peace officer with the Milpitas Police Department (MPD), offer the following Statement of Facts which summarizes the police reports, witness interviews, 911 calls, surveillance video and continuing investigation of MPD Case number 26-240-066.

On August 28, 2026, at approximately 1201 hours, Milpitas Police Department (MPD) received multiple reports of a hit-and-run collision at the Mill Creek Apartments, located at 440 Dixon Landing Road in Milpitas. The initial reports stated a blue SUV had struck and run over a female pedestrian near Building F. As the investigation progressed, the incident was determined to be an intentional act and investigated as a homicide.

Officer Munoz #363, Sergeant Thanh #297, and Officer Orendia #362 responded to the scene. Officer Munoz located Victim [REDACTED] lying in the parking lot with severe bleeding from her head. Milpitas Fire and Paramedics responded and attempted to provide medical aid. She was pronounced deceased at approximately 1212 hours by Milpitas Paramedic Jones #P47733. Physical evidence at the scene indicated that she had been struck in the parking lot near Building F. Three parked vehicles had also been struck and had damage to their passenger sides. The suspect vehicle had fled the scene.

At approximately 1209 hours, while Detective Lum #357 and I were responding to the scene, MPD Dispatch advised that a reporting party informed MPD Dispatch that there was a blue Toyota SUV bearing California license plate [REDACTED] at Walgreens at 1833 N. Milpitas Boulevard. The reporting party (RP) advised that the vehicle was driving recklessly when it passed him. The RP said marked patrol vehicles passed the Toyota, and it immediately parked at the Walgreens. The RP believed that the driver of the vehicle was trying to evade MPD officers. The RP watched the Toyota as it was parked at the Walgreens until it was contacted by MPD units. He did not observe anyone entering or exiting the Toyota.

Detective Lum and I responded to Walgreens and located a blue Toyota Highlander bearing California license plate [REDACTED]. The Toyota had heavy front-end damage. The Walgreens is located less than 1 mile east of the Mill Creek Apartments.

Suspect Anila Baby was seated inside the Toyota Highlander. She appeared incoherent and was unable to answer questions. She had visible injuries and blood on her arms and legs.

Statements obtained from family members and friends of Suspect and Victim revealed that suspect and victim knew each other, resided in the same large apartment complex on Dixon Landing Road and were good friends.

Officer Hyon #368 contacted [REDACTED], who witnessed the collision. [REDACTED] said he saw the victim walking near Building F when a blue SUV approached. [REDACTED] said the SUV was initially traveling slowly but then accelerated toward the victim. [REDACTED] believed the driver intentionally drove toward the victim because the driver appeared to see her before accelerating. [REDACTED] said the SUV struck the victim with the passenger-side tires and then struck three parked vehicles. [REDACTED] said the driver did not stop to check on the victim and instead left the complex.

Officer Munoz #321 contacted [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], who were walking through the apartment complex. [REDACTED] said she and [REDACTED] saw a blue vehicle driving quickly toward them and they moved out of its path. They then saw the victim lying on the ground and saw the blue vehicle leaving through the north driveway toward Dixon Landing Road. [REDACTED] told Officer Munoz he heard tires screeching several times and then saw a vehicle involved in a collision. As he and [REDACTED] continued walking, he saw the victim lying in the parking lot and realized she knew victim from the apartment complex. [REDACTED] saw the vehicle leave through the north driveway and described the driver as an Indian woman. [REDACTED] said he had never seen the driver before and would not be able to identify her.

I briefly spoke with [REDACTED] at the scene. [REDACTED] said he was stopped directly behind the Toyota when the incident happened. He stated that the Toyota was blocking him in the parking lot, but he never honked at the vehicle because he saw the victim walking towards it and realized that she would be getting into the vehicle soon. [REDACTED] said the suspect vehicle was a blue SUV. He was not sure of the make at first but later learned it was a Toyota. [REDACTED] said the victim appeared to be smiling and seemed to be friendly with the driver. He said he was waiting behind the Toyota as the victim walked toward the vehicle. [REDACTED] noticed the victim was carrying a bag in her hand. [REDACTED] said, based on the way the victim and the driver were interacting, he thought the driver was either an Uber driver or a friend of the victim. He said they did not appear to be arguing or having any type of problem with each other. [REDACTED] said the victim appeared to be happy. [REDACTED] said that when the victim walked in front of the Toyota, the vehicle suddenly accelerated from a stopped position and struck her. The Toyota continued forward and crashed into three parked vehicles. [REDACTED] said he was shocked because everything happened so quickly and he did not expect the Toyota to accelerate. [REDACTED] said the Toyota briefly stopped after the collision but then continued driving away from the scene. [REDACTED] did not see the driver.

Officer Sevilla #311 responded to the scene. Officer Sevilla is assigned to the traffic division and upon his arrival reviewed the physical evidence and witness information. Officer Sevilla examined the scene and did not observe tire friction marks showing the suspect attempted to brake before the collision. Based on the witness statements and physical evidence, Officer Sevilla believed the suspect accelerated into the victim and continued driving into the parked vehicles. Officer Sevilla believed the collision was intentional.

Based on the totality of the investigation, I determined that the suspect was driving the Toyota Highlander when she struck the victim with her vehicle. Witnesses reported seeing the vehicle accelerate suddenly and rapidly striking the victim after the victim walked in front of the vehicle

and after the suspect vehicle was at a complete stop. After striking the victim, the suspect continue driving, striking three parked vehicles before fleeing the scene without stopping to check on the victim or provide assistance. The Toyota Highlander was located shortly afterward with damage consistent with the collision, and the suspect was found inside the vehicle.

Based on the witness statements, video footage, physical evidence, the suspect's location when arrested, the condition of the Toyota Highlander after the collision, and the circumstances under which the suspect was located, I believe that suspect murdered [REDACTED] in violation of Penal Code section 187(a) by intentionally striking the victim with her vehicle, killing her, and then fleeing the scene.
